

Plans for Expansion

Nehemiah rode around the walls of Jerusalem, viewing the needs of the city. After realizing the needs, he purposed in his heart to rebuild the walls (Neh. 2:12-18). Nehemiah allowed two things to give him confidence in his endeavor. First, he knew that the work was right in the sight of God, and second, he knew that the work was right in the eyes of his king.

Much like Nehemiah seeing the need, we have seen the need for a new chapel. We need a larger chapel for various special days. Building a new chapel also will allow us to use the old chapel to meet the need for a larger eating area and class room. I believe that this expansion is right in the eyes of God and that it is right in the eyes of all brethren with whom I have counselled, including the Trustees and Calvary MBC, who have approved this project.

The chapel will include about 2,000 square feet. At an estimated cost of \$100 per square foot, the cost would be \$200,000. The Trustees voted to raise \$100,000 before beginning any work. We already have volunteers pledging services and gifts toward the needs. Please join us in praying for this project, and if you can help us, please send any offerings marked "building fund."

Take Time with the Lord

At the time of this writing, I stand at the threshold of an unbelievably busy summer. Preaching appointments, church camps, Vacation Bible School, associational meetings and a squeezed-in vacation have all laid claim to the next few weeks of my calendar. This is normal for preachers in the summer months. Life is busy.

With all of these events looming, a person must possess some ability to organize. I will readily admit that I am not the best example of what an organizer should be. I am not a procrastinator, but I do struggle horribly with forgetfulness. I have learned to write notes, but I usually either forget to look at my notes or I forget where I put them. Either way, still a struggle. So, from time to time I will forget something. It's never good, even quite embarrassing at times. But as I look back, I do not see utter destruction in my life because of the occasional failure.

One thing I have learned to do is focus on the little stuff. I am not referring to micromanaging the count of the VBS snacks, but I am encouraging more detailed focus than just the big picture view. If I look at the monthly view of my calendar, very few days are clean. The vast majority are inked-in with predetermined events. I cannot move them to another week or another month. So, the broad picture is several upcoming months with back to back responsibilities. This can easily be overwhelming. How will I get all of this done?

Start with today. Am I ready for today? Have I made preparation for today? As the events of today chew through the time kept by the clock on the wall, slow down every now and then and enjoy. I'm not encouraging a lack of planning or long-term preparation, but if a person spends every minute of today planning for tomorrow, he will lose today. Be responsible, but do not fret.

Bow your head. Walk up Calvary's hill and sit down. Stay there for a minute. Remember the awesome price paid for your redemption. Consider God's love for you. This should be happening every day in the life of a saved person. Paul wrote, "For which cause we faint not; but though our outward man perish, yet the inward man is renewed day by day" (2 Corinthians 4:16). Never let your day be so busy tending to the Master's work, that you never sit down and spend time with the Master.

Be diligent. Be prepared. Do not be lazy. But do not spend time fretting over the future. A man can worry all day about a day that hasn't come and lose the day he had. Jesus said, "Take therefore no thought for the morrow: for the morrow shall take thought for the things of itself. Sufficient unto the day is the evil thereof" (Matthew 6:34).

Have you got too much on your plate? For just a moment, wipe everything else off, set the Bible on your plate and let God feed you.



Louisiana Missions:

What is a Missionary?

A student in my class this past semester asked, "What is a missionary?" He had spoken with a young lady who was struggling with understanding what the Lord wanted from her life. Someone had told her that she should consider being a missionary and proceeded to list all of the activities that she could do. This included feeding the poor, finding homes for the homeless, working in an orphanage, and so on. Her distress was over what "type" of missionary she should become. The student was seeking guidance as to what distinguishes a missionary from all other areas of service.

Titles indicate occupations. Medical doctors diagnose and treat diseases. Lawyers practice the law. A policeman serves and protects. A teacher instructs. While many things are involved in each of these jobs, each one has a distinct purpose.

While the title of missionary has become broad in its use today, the one who bears the title has a very distinct purpose. The term, while not used in Scripture, has been a fitting description of the role of a man who has answered the call to serve in a particular area. His job is to preach the gospel, baptize the saved, and instruct the faithful. His ultimate purpose is to see the establishment of a church. The Louisiana State Association Mission Policy defines the classification of a missionary as, "One who is sent to a particular field of labor with the intent of organizing a New Testament church."

The missionary's job is not to establish the church, but to do the work so that the Lord might establish a church. The doctor cannot heal, but he can do things that might lead to a healing. A lawyer cannot decide a case, but he can argue it in a way to influence its outcome. An officer may arrest, but he cannot convict. A teacher can do all in his power to instruct, but only the student can learn what is taught. In the same way, a missionary does the work in anticipation of the result of an established church.

There are many servants of the Lord today who serve in various roles that might not fall into the calling of a missionary. Each and every individual is vital to the work of the Lord's churches. You may not be a missionary, but your work in support of missions and serving as senders (Rom. 10:15) is as important as the men on the field. The prayers along with the financial and logistical support are essential in the spread of the gospel and the establishment of new churches.

The meeting was well attended with pastors and missionaries as we discussed and heard reports from the 155 Recommended Missionaries. Preservation and Perseverance

Though sometimes confused, these two doctrines are distinctly different and should be appreciated by Bible students accordingly. The confusion of these two doctrines can result in a heretical teaching of works for salvation or a Calvinistic view of selective salvation. Paul presented a proper understanding of the two in Ephesians 2:8-10. In verses 8 and 9, Paul wrote that salvation was by grace through faith. Therefore, works have no merit in salvation. Neither do good works help keep the believer saved (2 Tim. 1:12). Believers are kept or preserved in Christ Jesus without good works. In verse 10, Paul explained that God has ordained that the believer should walk in good works. The Christian walk is a testimony for Christ to the glory of the Father (Matt. 5:16).

Preservation

Preservation is the act of keeping something from injury or decay (Webster). An example of preservation exists where Jude declared himself "preserved in Jesus Christ" (Jude 1). Paul also referred to himself as "the prisoner of Jesus Christ" (Ephesians 3:1). Peter also taught that God keeps the salvation of the believer in 1 Peter 1:4, 5.

The believer is preserved in Jesus Christ, because Jesus lives (John 14:19); because no condemnation exist for the believer (Romans 8:1); because Jesus gives the believer eternal life at the moment of faith (John 10:28); because the spirit nature cannot be changed (John 3:6); because the sins of the flesh do not affect the new birth or the new creature (1 John 3:9; 5:18); because the Father assures the believer's victory (Romans 8:29, 30); because the Son assures the believer's victory (John 10:28; Romans 8:34); because the Holy Spirit assures the believer's victory (Rom. 8:15-25; Eph. 1:13, 14). The doctrine of preservation is basically the doctrine of security of the believer. God preserves the believer and He only is worthy of the glory.

Perseverance

Biblical perseverance applies to believers who are already preserved in Christ, and persevere in being faithful to the Lord, in such as spiritual growth and commitment. This is often referred to as "progressive sanctification." The Word of God contains several admonitions for believers to persevere in good works; not to be saved; and not because they have been chosen and forced to do so; but because they have been saved by choice and desire to live for the Lord who saved them (Matt. 5:16; Rom. 12:2; Eph. 4:1; 6:10-18; Gal. 6:9; 1 Peter 4:2).

A typical Calvinistic statement might be, "God selected me and will cause me to persevere in good works until the end, and if I should backslide, I will return to faithfulness before I die so that I will go to heaven, and it will be so because God has chosen me to go to Heaven." This is salvation by selection and without choice, a sinful and arrogant teaching. Nothing could be more unbiblical and farther from the truth. The Bible does not support the five points of Calvinism, or T.U.L.I.P., of which forced perseverance (P) by good works is a part.

A typical Arminian statement might be, "I must persevere in good works to be saved." This is salvation by human works, but Paul wrote, "not of works, lest any man should boast" (Ephesians 2:9). It is truly dishonoring to God to suggest that a sinful man can replace the blood of Jesus with his filthy works. Isaiah declared, "all our righteousnesses are as filthy rags" (Isaiah 64:6).

Believers are preserved in Jesus Christ forever and can never be unsaved or lost again. Therefore, because of their security in Christ, they should willingly persevere in good works for the glory of God (Matt. 5:16; Eph. 2:10; 1 Cor. 6:19, 20). Paul concluded, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 15:57, 58).



Looking Unto Jesus:

Misunderstandings Which Lead to Hell

A rich young man came to Jesus one day, in Matthew 19:16-22, and wanted to know how to live forever. That should be something that is interesting to us all. I think most people want to live forever. Most want to know the answer to this question, however, too many are like this young man, not satisfied with the answer. There are four reasons why this young man missed Jesus, and after 2,000 years, people are still making the very same mistakes that he made.

He misunderstood salvation in verse 16. He wanted to know what good thing he could do to be saved. There are many false views concerning salvation! People look for salvation by works, faith plus works, birthright, denomination, etc. Salvation is not about "do", it is about "Done"!

There is only one way of salvation, one way to miss Hell and one way to Heaven. It's the same today as it was on the day we read about. If you will ever be saved, then you must get to the cross and meet Jesus! Don't misunderstand and miss Jesus.

He misunderstood the Savior in verses 16-17. Notice he called Him "Good Master." He called Him a great man, but not God! Any other view concerning Jesus but that He is 100% God and 100% man will never bring a person to the place of salvation. Jesus is indeed a master Teacher, but He is also God! Anything less makes Him less than God and you less than saved! Who is Jesus to you? Don't misunderstand Him! You must believe it all, or you will never be saved!

He misunderstood his sins in verses 17-20. He says "all these have I kept." There's no way he had kept all these laws. We humans love to determine our righteousness based on other's unrighteousness. Salvation is always accompanied by conviction of sins and confession of sins. Sin can never be dealt with until it is brought into the open. Please do not let pride stand between you and your eternal salvation! How sad to think that many will go to hell because they won't admit their sinfulness.

He misunderstood his stuff in verses 21-22. Notice he left "sorrowful....he had great possessions!" No material possession, no sin, no pleasure, and no indulgence is worth going to Hell over! God promises us more in return than we could ever give up. Your physical life won't last forever, but God has eternity to repay! Come to Christ His way today and live eternally.
