Why LMBIS?

Within the last month, I have had two young men, who are dear to my heart, announce that God has called them to preach. My heart is rejoicing. But what is next for a young man when he surrenders to preach?

The two young men I referenced still have a commitment to fulfill. They are both still in high school. The first item on their agendas is to get their diplomas. They should take this time in school to begin training their minds for a life of study. A disciplined mind is crucial to the needed study of the ministry. These young men should approach their studies with the same effort exerted in sermon preparation. The objective is excellence springing forth from effort. If they allow themselves to start settling for "good enough," then they are likely to begin their ministerial studies the same way. I pray that they may excel in their secular studies and then enroll in LMBIS as soon as God opens the door for them.

Does a preacher have to attend a seminary to pastor one of the Lord's churches? Absolutely not. God calls men to preach. Seminaries do not make preachers. A seminary is an avenue through which a man helps to prepare himself for a lifetime of ministry. Many men are successfully pastoring even though they never attended a seminary. So, a fair question is "Why attend seminary?"

First, by attending LMBIS a student learns at a much faster rate than he ever would on his own. The instructors at LMBIS are men who are well versed in the subjects they are teaching. Our objective is to help every student reach his full potential for the Lord.

Louisiana Missions:

Assisting Those in Need

Once Rome had demolished Jerusalem in response to the Jewish uprising, a historically unknown faction suffered tremendously. The first generation of Christians faced debilitating poverty. Scourged by the Gentile army and scorned by the people of their heritage, the early Christians were left destitute, but yet dependent upon the Lord.

As a response to the growing need, the Apostle Paul shared this need with the churches established during his travels. Many of them rose to the occasion and sent a large offering to assist the Christians of Judea. Of this offering, Paul wrote specific instructions to the church at Corinth. In both letters, he commanded and exhorted them on when and how they were to give.

The first thing he mentioned was the example set by churches not as well off as the church at Corinth. The Macedonian churches had accepted the grace of God, and, despite their own poverty, were able to give a substantial amount. Paul shared with the Corinthians that the Macedonians gave themselves first to the Lord and then to the need as related by Paul.

Using this example, Paul encouraged the church in Corinth to give as well. They had expressed a desire to help, but he exhorted them in his second letter to do an actual collection. No amount of pity or prayers ever take the place of actual obedience to God. James mentioned this as well, "And one of you say unto them, Depart in peace, be ye warmed and filled; notwithstanding ye give them not those things which are needful to the body; what doth it profit?" (James 2:16).

The most important part in helping people is helping people. That is, going beyond knowing the need and actually meeting the need. The greatest example of this is found in Christ, "For ye know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that, though he was rich, yet for your sakes he became poor, that ye through his poverty might be rich" (2 Corinthians 8:9).

I would like to encourage you, as Paul encouraged Corinth, to assist those in need. The most recent is Bro. Eddie Wise. He has faithfully pastored a struggling church, working two additional jobs, and raising a young family. His recent diagnosis of a tumor and subsequent treatments will put him out of the pulpit and out of work for a while. Please prayerfully consider assisting Bro. Eddie and his family. I know that the Lord's grace is available to us as we help him and others like him who stand in need.

PIONEERING THE NEW FRONTIER OF MISSION WORK

Matthew 5:43-48

ABA Annual Missions Message - Bro. Jason Hebert

We are facing a new frontier of ministry in a new foreign field called, "America". Churches of every 'brand' are in crisis as the Gen-Xers are looking for country club churches to blend in with the crowd, and millennials are just done with the hypocrisy they see in us. Furthermore, 47% of Millennials believe it is wrong to share their personal beliefs with someone in hopes that one day they will share that same faith! Concerning Generation Z, the millennial's children, only 4% of them have a biblical worldview.

There is only one answer. We need to enact the Book of Acts. This book isn't strictly a NARRATIVE, it is also NORMATIVE. It details the pattern established for God's people today! The apostles turned the World upside down because they preached in the synagogues and to the pagans in the temples that the same Christ saw their brokenness and lived to die in order to bind that which was broken. We need that same spirit of evangelism! Evangelism could simply be defined as the BEING, DOING and TELLING of the GOSPEL in order that the lost might HEAR, REPENT and BELIEVE in Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior!

- **BEING the GOSPEL**—that is your personal experience with the Gospel? Philemon 6
- **DOING the GOSPEL**—that is living outwardly that changed life before others?
- TELLING the GOSPEL—that is speaking the words of life to the dead in sin?

This is what Jesus is addressing in our text. The Sermon on the Mount is perhaps the most recognizable sermon that Jesus preached. In it, Jesus challenges His followers to go beyond what everyone else was doing and recognize the heart of true faith. He admonishes us to ascend above the mediocre level of spirituality of the day to be who our Father saved us to be. In our passage, we find Jesus inviting us to another level of love for those around us. To go beyond our comfort zones and be the evangelistic missionaries the world needs! How can we create a spirit of evangelism in our churches? How can we create an atmosphere of BEING, DOING and TELLING the Gospel that is the NORM instead of the exception?

Jesus offers us the keys on how we can be pioneers in this new frontier of mission work.

I. TRANSFORM YOUR TRADITION vs. 43-45

It doesn't matter if you skip the 3rd verse of every hymn, do a church fellowship singing on the 5th Sunday or sing a Happy Birthday every week of the year! There isn't anything wrong with those traditions, and most others that churches practice, knowingly or unknowingly; however, any tradition that contradicts the scripture is wrong and should be abandoned! I'm referring to the unwritten, and often practiced traditions,

that keep us from sharing our faith! Jesus calls his men out on the very topic of sticking with tradition at the expense of the Gospel. Nowhere in the Bible does it teach to HATE anyone. In fact, loving ALL, even our enemies, has been a central part of Christian ethics for nearly 2000 years! What traditions do we need to transform?

A. The Tradition of Getting Stuck on the Inside

That is, becoming so inwardly focused. Everything we do becomes about us and what we like and what we want and what we enjoy. Reaching OUT is replaced with relaxing IN! Failure to reach out leads to an eventual natural death, because eventually the kids move away, and the parents pass on. This must change!

B. The Tradition of Staring at the Outside

God help us if we ever think that someone wouldn't "fit" into our view of what God's family should look like. God is no respecter of persons, which means that God has no favorites! There is no place for religious elitism in the Lord's churches! We are all the same; broken and in need of fixing!

C. The Tradition of Substituting Invitations for Evangelism

I'm not sure when it happened, but it seems at some point we decided that instead of personally sharing our faith, we would instead just invite someone to an event. Come to our "whatever" production, Heaven's Gates Hell's Flames, Easter egg hunt or Christmas Eve Candlelight service. The Bible EMPHATICALLY declares that faith comes by hearing, and hearing by the Word of God!

II. WIDEN YOUR WITNESS vs. 46-47, Acts 1:8

We need to ask God to stretch us out of our comfort zone. If we want to be the witnesses God has called us to be, we need to cast a wider net! We use a lot of buzzwords, like living on mission, or being cross cultural, but a lot of the time we don't really recognize what that means. We get into our isolated little bubbles and stay there, but Jesus reprimands such a mentality. He says that we aren't any better than the Publicans who only care about their own.

A. The Global Field of Evangelism

We clearly see and celebrate the worldwide reach of missions! We rejoice in the souls saved locally and globally! We almost universally see the local, state, national and foreign mission fields taught by these locations, however, we run the risk of deceiving ourselves that we are actually doing something by having our treasurers write a check once a month. It's one thing to provide financially for the mission work, but what about those care packages sent to specific missionaries, what about a hand-written note that says you are praying for those missionaries, what about first hand participation at a mission point?

B. The Personal Focus of Evangelism

We must also look at this verse personally! Jesus is telling His church that they are on a personal mission to (*See Pioneering on page 6*)

Looking Unto Jesus:

Mission Work What Does It Take?

Webster defines the word, mission, as a sending. "Missionary" is defined as a person sent to evangelize the heathen according to Webster's 1828 dictionary. Missionaries are sent with a specific purpose. Romans 10 tells us that saving faith results from hearing the word of God. Who will share this word? The missionary! Who will send the missionary? The local church and the Holy Spirit of God! For people to hear, missionaries must be sent on a mission. What does it take to do mission work?

First, no one has ever done mission work successfully and not had to use Faith. What is Faith? Hebrews 11:1 says, "Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." Hebrews 11:6a tells us, "But without faith it is impossible to please him..." Mission work requires faith on that part of both missionary and sending church. There will be many things along the way which are "unkown" or "unseen" to man, however, all things are known to God. Our faith is tested and strengthened through uncertainty!

Next, mission work requires Finances. It will cost us and we should be willing to give to the cause. It is our duty to give financially to missionaries. It is our honor! Paul had a deep loving relationship for the Philippian believers due to their generosity and love towards him. They supplied for him in many ways including financially (Philippians 4:15-23). This is the greatest investment which can be made. We are never commanded to build buildings but we are commanded to preach the word. That will cost us because preachers must be sent.

Last, mission work requires Fervency. Mission work takes fervent Prayer and Participation by us as believers. We need a passion for what we say we believe! We must be fervent in our desire to see lost souls saved and new churches established. We should pray fervently, send fervently and go participate in missions fervently.

A notorious British murderer was sentenced to die. On the morning of his execution the prison chaplain walked beside him to the gallows and routinely read some Scriptures. The prisoner was shocked that the chaplain was so unmoved and uncompassionate. He said to the preacher, "Sir, if I believed what you and the church say you believe, even if England was covered in broken glass from coast to coast, I would walk over it- if need be on my hands and knees- and think it worthwhile, just to save one soul from an eternal hell like that."

How passionate and fervent are we about fulfilling the commission? Oswald Smith said, "Any church that is not seriously involved in carrying out the Great Commission has forfeited its' right to exist." Let us be actively involved in mission work on every level!

reach people just like them: our Jerusalem! Paul was so consumed with this that he said if it were possible he would give up his own salvation and spend eternity in Hell, if it would mean that his people would come to faith in Christ. As we live our lives, we meet people who are similar to us, our Judea. These are the people we frequently meet. Then he mentions those of our Samaria, or people who are quite different from us; a different race, economic status, different clothing, different likes and even different political affiliation! Finally, did you know, that even in your own city there are people who don't even talk like you, our uttermost parts of the earth are in our very own back yard!

C. The Powerful Force of Evangelism

There is only one thing that can propel us to reach those around us with the Gospel: LOVE! Only one thing will enable us to go and keep going: LOVE! The knowledge that God loved you when you were so unlovable will radically transform your thinking and keep you focused on winning the lost! The time is too short, Hell is too real, and the Gospel is too important for us to sit back and watch it all burn! We must go forward and do the work of an evangelist!

III. PERFECT YOUR PURPOSE vs. 48

Finally, we must ask God to perfect our purpose! God doesn't want us to wander aimlessly about but instead live a life of focused purpose.

A. The Priority of Our Encounters

--Jesus came to show us what a relationship with the Father was like and if your purpose is anything less than THAT, then it is off, and you will never be an evangelistic person. Our hope and goal should be for people to have an encounter with the LOVE of God, the POWER of God and the TRUTH of God!

B. The Practicality of Our Evangelism

--Someone has said that a habit takes place at the intersection of knowledge, skill and desire. When it comes to evangelism, it will only happen at the same intersection. We all have the knowledge and awareness of the problem and most of us have the skill necessary to fix it. Our biggest issue is the desire. Do we care enough to act or would we rather be keyboard warriors who blog and debate in social media circles? Listen, the time is too short, Hell is too real and the Gospel is too precious for us to not act!

CONCLUSION: We surely don't need a new gospel, a new doctrine, or a new power to blaze this trail through the new frontier, but we do need a fresh encounter with the Gospel. Lost people aren't looking for a theologian to fix their philosophy. They are starving for a shepherd to feed them and bind their brokenness.
