Truth Is Still Truth

The Roman authorities had arrested and were questioning Jesus. In the middle of the process, Pilate asked Jesus the question, "What is truth?"


Many today have accepted the idea that truth is whatever one wants it to be. These same persons also feel that, if it is expedient, truth can be changed to satisfy a current condition. It has become commonplace for convenience to be more valuable than truth. Men will say whatever is necessary to gratify the ears of those who are yearning to be pleased. The Lord warned of this condition when Paul wrote to Timothy and declared, "For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears" (2 Timothy 4:3).

Many embrace the idea that truth with slight alterations is still truth. These people believe adjustments to the fringes of truth are acceptable as long as the core remains pure. These philosophies have inundated our society and are infiltrating the Lord's churches. Too many have adopted the idea that whatever pleases them is truth.

Paul wrote, "Professing themselves to be wise, they became fools, And changed the glory of the uncorruptible God into an image made like to corruptible man, and to birds, and fourfooted beasts, and creeping things. Wherefore God also gave them up to uncleanness through the lusts of their own hearts, to dishonour their own bodies between themselves: Who changed the truth of God into a lie, and worshipped and served the creature more than the Creator, who is blessed for ever. Amen" (Romans 1:21-25).

The only reason anyone would replace one thing for another, is because they are of the opinion that the replacement is better than the original. The people mentioned in the Romans text were persuaded there was something better than God's glory and truth, so they invented replacements. They replaced God as the focal point of glory and replaced Him with man, birds, beasts and creeping things. Then, in conjunction with their previous exchange, they, feeling there was something better, replaced God's truth with a lie.

God is God, and there exists no other. Regardless of how much man may try to change Him, it will not be done. The prophet Malachi recorded these words, "For I am the LORD, I change not..." (Malachi 3:6). James wrote, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning" (James 1:17). The Psalmist wrote, "Thy word is true from the beginning: and every one of thy righteous judgments endureth for ever" (Psalms 119:160). The Lord has not changed, His word has not changed and His truth is still the truth.

The Value of a Seminary Education

"I don't have to attend a seminary to be a preacher," is the mantra of some ministers. I have heard this several times over the years. It is generally stated defensively during discussion surrounding the topic of ministerial education. It is a statement, which on the surface I agree with, yet in spirit it inserts a hedge of self-will into what should be a surrendered servant's heart.

I have known many good and decent ministers who have never attended seminary. Most of whom told me unequivocally in their later years that they wish they had. One of those pastored a relatively large congregation and was active in preaching revival services for our churches all over the south. He had a way about his preaching that simplified even the most difficult of biblical topics. Yet he had no formal seminary training. Toward the end of what could be considered a fruitful ministry, he reflected on this fact with regret.

"Seminary does not make preachers, but it does equip them for what they are called to do." This mantra is chanted methodically throughout the halls of every seminary. The value of a seminary comes to the forefront when considering this statement. No man, church, or seminary can call a man to the ministry. Only the Lord does the calling. A seminary serves as an arm that the Lord uses to equip His men.

A school for God-called men is a biblical practice. When Jericho was rebuilt by the Israelites, a large school was founded to serve the prophets of Israel during the time of the kings. These men no doubt learned about the law and the ways of God from those who were farther on their journey than themselves. Here men were given the opportunity to separate from the world and join with others in educating themselves for their service. It did not make the men prophets, but it did provide a place of learning for the unlearned.

Seminary provides for a man new to the ministry a place to hone his craft (preaching) and grow in knowledge (studying). While these two things can be accomplished in active service,

it does not come easy and can be fraught with failures and disappointments. Seminary offers the ability to unlearn things as well as learn them. Opportunities are available to meet certain expectations with a better safety-net for shortcomings than what can be found in the field of service. Many errors and corrections can be pragmatically made within the confines of the seminary experience that will not hinder a local church.

The seminary culture also provides a haven for a man new to the ministry. Interactions in and out of class provide a sense of "sharpening" for a man's service to God's people. The ministry is a business of ministering God's word to God's people. For a man to be productive, he must learn to deal with God's people in a godly way. Seminary provides an excellent opportunity to learn to work with others and to do so in the spirit and not the flesh. As one minister told me when I started seminary, "If you can get along with preachers, you can get along with anybody in a Baptist church." This statement has been proven to me many times over the years.

Pride is the biggest struggle of the servant of God. Admitting we need help in our ministry is often the hardest thing we can confess. While some things such as family situations or ministry situations keep men from attending seminary immediately after their call, pride is the number one culprit in an unwillingness to go to school. Coming to school is saying, "I can't do it alone. I need help." Praise the Lord for those who recognize this early in their calling.

If you have struggled with the idea of seminary, this article has probably either encouraged or enraged you. If you are encouraged, then step out by faith. The Lord will provide for you and your family. Please cling to the promise of Matthew 6:33 concerning God's abundant supply. If you find yourself enraged by the prospect of seminary, then you may not be ready to further your Christian education in a seminary setting. Seminary is not for those who do not realize they need it.

Why We Serve God

Like many young pastors, I spend a lot of my time behind the pulpit preaching on two points: salvation and service. Why I preach the Gospel is understandable enough. There are many lost people in our world today who need a personal relationship with their Creator. I have noticed the more I simply preach about Jesus, the more visitors seem to wander in through the door. I preach the Gospel in hopes that the lost get saved, and that the saved start serving the Lord. If, however,

you ask me why we should serve the Lord, recently, I might have given a different answer than I would now.

We should serve the Lord at least three reasons. First, because He is deserving of our service. Second, because we were created to serve Him. Third, because the Bible instructs us to serve Him. These are all perfectly appropriate answers, but recently, another reason has become obvious to me, and it is one that stems from my marriage.

My wife and I have been married for a little over a year now, and if I have learned anything so far, it is the value and importance of service in a marriage. The Bible instructs wives to submit themselves to their husbands as unto the Lord (Eph. 5:22). It also instructs husbands to love their wives, even as Christ loved the church, and gave himself for it (Eph. 5:24). In both of these commands, we find the need to serve one another. Wives must serve their husbands and submit to them as the spiritual leader of their homes, just as the husband should submit his will to Christ and allow Him to lead his life.


Husbands must love their wives so much as to sacrifice for them and serve them, as pictured by Christ’s ultimate sacrifice and act of service for the church. This can only be done through one godly virtue, love. When we choose to love our spouses the way we should, we will serve our spouses the way we should. We cannot have one without the other.

Our relationship with the Lord is similar. I think there is a reason so many analogies are drawn in the Scriptures between a marital relationship and the relationship between Christ and His churches. Christ, motivated by love, served us by laying His life down on the cross, and we should serve the Lord for the same reason.

Jesus once said to his disciples “Henceforth I have called you not servants ... but I have called your friends” (John 15:15). A friend is one who loves and serves another. God called Abraham a friend. Friendship is a labor of service. One must make effort to maintain a strong relationship with friends. If you want to be friends with your spouse, you are going to have to work at loving and serving them to be a friend to them. Our world has become so selfish today, many people aren’t willing to put forth the effort to make real friends. Humans are more lonely and divided than we have been in a long time because of a lack of laboring, loving, and serving others.

If we are going to have a good marriage, it will be done through love and service. If we are going to have a good relationship with our friends, then do for them and serve them as well. And most importantly, if we will have a good relationship with our God, we must do it through serving Him, not because He needs our service (as He certainly does not), but because we love Him enough to be a friend to Him, as He is to us.
