I am Blessed



Idle Threats

Have you ever been threatened? Most of us have. Maybe the threat was from a parent who was threatening to spank us for disobedience. Maybe the threat was from an opponent during an athletic competition. Or maybe the threat was from an authority figure at school or work. All these threats would rightfully be considered legitimate because the threat-maker possesses the ability and authority to carry out what has been threatened.

But some other threats are not as legitimate. If someone threatened to sue me because they claimed I breathed their air, I would not in any way be worried about their threat. If a 6-year-old threatens to beat me up, I would not be concerned at all. These types of threats are silly and do not warrant any of our attention.

The objective with a threat is to get someone to alter their behavior. Human beings are free-will beings and do what they choose to do. When we want another person to quit doing (or start doing) something, we want them to stop themselves. We realize that we do not have power over their will, so we try to change their will with threats of consequence.

Satan knows well of the effectiveness of threats. Luke recorded, "But when they had commanded them to go aside out of the council, they conferred among themselves, Saying, What shall we do to these men? for that indeed a notable miracle hath been done by them is manifest to all them that dwell in Jerusalem; and we cannot deny it. But that it spread no further among the people, let us straitly threaten them, that they speak henceforth to no man in this name. And they called them, and commanded them not to speak at all nor teach in the name of Jesus. But Peter and John answered and said unto them, Whether it be right in the sight of God to hearken unto you more than unto God, judge ye. For we cannot but speak the things which we have seen and heard. So when they had further threatened them, they let them go, finding nothing how they might punish them, because of the people: for all men glorified God for that which was done" (Acts 4:15-21).

Satan is constantly using threats as a tactic to keep God's people from living in obedience to their Lord. Is Satan using threats to keep you from obedience? Are you afraid of what will happen if you start sharing Jesus with everyone around you? Are you fearful of giving the Lord everything you should?

We would do well to remember that we serve the King of Kings. Satan can't do anything to us without the Lord's allowance. Don't fear the "might be's" that will very likely never be.

Because of the expert leadership of Bro. Grigsby, the business was able to secure two Payroll Protection loans (PPP), which were eventually fully forgiven. While that enabled the business to survive the Covid-19 pandemic, it should be noted that there is a great need for increased productivity to increase cash flow. The Baptist Sunday School Committee is aware of the needs and is working diligently to bring solutions and report to the messenger assembly in the 2023 meeting in Spokane, Washington.

The committee has worked with Bro. Grigsby for the last four years and has recognized the Lord's hand in his election to the office and the quality of his leadership. The committee stands as one in the complete confidence in Bro. Grigsby's labor in the office and is saddened by his resignation. We pray God's richest blessings upon him and his family as he assumes his pastorate and thank the Lord for using him in the office

of Business Manager and serving the churches of the American Baptist Association with great skill and integrity.

Additionally, on September 29, 2022, the committee met in special session to elect Bro. James Crain as Business Manager, as per Article XI, Section 2 of the Articles of Agreement. Bro. Crain is a Past President of the American Baptist Association and is well qualified and respected to assume the position. After unanimous vote of the committee, Bro. Crain indicated that, after prayer and seeking the will of the Lord, he accepted the position. Bro. Grigsby's resignation is official as of October 12, 2022. On October 13, 2022, Bro. Crain will assume the duties of Business Manager. We thank the Lord for His direction and moving on the hearts of the men of the committee and, most certainly, on the heart of Bro. Crain. We ask for your prayers as Bro. Crain assumes the position of Business Manager, for our Editor-in-Chief, Bro. At the 50 year celebration, we were privileged to hear from Bro. David Butimore, Chairman of the BSSC, from Bro. Terry Parrish, who has written a history of the ABA from 1972-2022 which will be included in the Time Capsule, and from Bro. Dean Grigsby, who has served as Business Manager of Bogard Press for the last four years.

The overwhelming emotion felt that day was one of gratitude. As we reflected on God's goodness toward us and His sustaining grace in the publishing ministry of Bogard Press, we could not help but express thanksgiving to God who has made this ministry possible. Calvanism: Part 2 Unconditional Election

Unconditional Election teaches that God has elected, or chosen, those who would be saved based on nothing other than His sovereign will. However, again, there are scriptures that clearly contradict this. Romans 10:9 says, "That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved." The word "if" in that verse places a clear condition upon salvation. Our salvation is conditioned upon whether we confess with our mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in our heart that God raised him from the dead.

Calvinists will also use Ephesians 1:4-5 to prove the point of unconditional election. It says, "According as he hath chosen us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before him in love: Having predestinated us unto the adoption of children by Jesus Christ to himself, according to the good pleasure of his will." The Calvinist will state that God chose us to be saved according only to the good pleasure of his will.

Ephesians 1:4-5, however, is teaching us something very different. God chose us, who are already saved, to be holy and without blame. He predestinated us, who are saved, to be adopted as His children. This passage is not teaching that God chose certain people to be saved according to his will. Rather, it is teaching that God chose those would be saved to have certain characteristics or qualities. God predestined that the saved would be His children and chose them to be holy and blameless.

This same concept is seen in Romans 8:28-30, "And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to his purpose. For whom he did foreknow, he also did predestinate to be conformed to the image of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brethren. Moreover, whom he did predestinate, them he also called: and whom he called, them he also justified: and whom he justified, them he also glorified."

The Calvinist use this passage to try to teach that God predestined certain individuals to be saved. However, a closer examination of this passage reveals that God foreknew who would be saved and therefore, predestined us to have certain characteristics or qualities. God predestinated that the saved would be conformed to the image of Jesus. These are also called, justified, and glorified. What a powerful promise that is for us! We know that when we believe on Christ, our salvation is forever. It's sealed, it's complete! Our justification and glorification is done! That's why in the next verse, Paul gives us some encouragement, "If God be for us, who can be against us?" The victory has been won!
