From the President

Two Reasons We Don't Change

I am on the cusp of a 55th birthday. To some I am old. To others I am young. While I struggle to see myself as an old man, the evidence is too glaring for me to pretend that I am young. Recently, I experienced a moment that is undeniable evidence of many candles on the cake...I was having a discussion about how much change I have seen in my lifetime.

I will not bore you with all my anecdotes. Many of you have as many, or more, than I. But I must at the least say, a lot has changed in my lifetime.

At Louisiana Missionary Baptist Institute & Seminary, we have seen our fair share of change. When I started in 1986, chalkboards were still in use, overhead projectors were the norm, and dittos were still being sniffed. Back then, we were still meeting in the old seminary building, the Upper Room (bachelor's quarters) was at the top of the hill, and the print shop consumed a lot of square footage. None of these exists anymore. Things have changed.

While change is inevitable, some things can't ever change. The doctrinal stance of LMBIS in 2023 is identical to the stance she held in 1986 (and before). Granted, opinions about a myriad of issues have moved about, but the Word of God is still the same. So every teaching from His Word, and about His Word is still the same. They must be. God has never given man the liberty to change His Word.

Two reasons LMBIS can never change are referenced by Paul in his letter to the Hebrews. He wrote, "By so much was Jesus made a surety of a better testament. And they truly were many priests, because they were not suffered to continue by reason of death: But this man, because he continueth ever, hath an unchangeable priesthood. Wherefore he is able also to save them to the uttermost that come unto God by him, seeing he ever liveth to make intercession for them (Hebrews 7:22-25).

The first reason is because the redemptive and intercessory work of Jesus never changes. He is still the only way for a person to be saved. He is still the only intercessor. His work has not changed.

The second reason we can't ever change is understood by the first. If Jesus is still the Savior and intercessor for man, it is because man still needs His work. Mankind is still sinful. This hasn't changed.

As a ministry of Calvary Baptist Church in Minden, LMBIS has always had helping preachers as her primary focus, but we want everyone to know that preachers are not our only passion. We also want to help every child of God become everything he or she can be for our King. LMBIS classes are beneficial to every child of God.

All of our classes (including our online classes starting this fall) are for everyone, not just preachers. Bible study, even through a seminary, is for everyone reading this article. We need to fill ourselves up with His Word because we are in a daily battle with the sin nature inside of us and the sinful world around us. This has not changed.

February has arrived, and people's hearts and minds have turned toward the idea of love. Love as an idea or emotion is a noun-the name of something. We use the word <u>love</u> as a noun when we often say, "I am (in <u>love</u>) with ______." (You fill in the blank.) We may use the word <u>love</u> as a noun when we say, "<u>Love</u> is more powerful than hate." Philosophers and poets talk and write about ideas and life, and they often use love in that context. Love as a verb, however, is more than an idea; it is an action.

God not only loved man and woman at creation, but He gave us love as an action in the form of Jesus Christ, His Son (Genesis 2:19-22; John 3:16). Jesus not only talked about love; He gave love everywhere He went. He was loving; He was a servant. He was doing the Father's work in that He <u>healed</u> the blind, the lame, the demon possessed, and the chronically ill (Mark 8:22-38; Matthew 4:24). He <u>taught</u> the people with parables (Matthew 13:24-30). He <u>comforted</u> those in their sorrows (John 11:25-26). He <u>prayed</u> for those about Him and for the believers of today (John 17:20-26). He <u>included</u> sinners and little children in His love (Matthew 9:10-12; Matthew 19:14). He <u>fed</u> the multitude with physical and spiritual food (John 6:11-14). Jesus showed that God is Love through His actions.

We, as Christians or followers of Christ, should love by our actions of service to others. We should use our God-given talents and abilities to honor God and to serve others. Many say perhaps that they have no talents. Many think because they do not teach, play an instrument, or sing in a choir that they have nothing to offer the Lord or others, but God can use any of His children. As winter invades the lives of the employees at Bogard Press and Baptist Bookstore, along with it comes times of colds, covid and sometimes bad weather conditions. However, the work goes on and I am thankful for the dedication of a great group of employees.

The finances for the ministry for the 2022 year reveal that it was somewhat of a difficult time with an overall loss. Much of the reason is the rising inflationary cost of raw materials on most every item needed to operate. For example, a signature sheet of paper rose in cost from .05 cents to .09 cents, which affects the cost of most everything we print. Other costs, such as repairs and parts to maintain machinery, also have risen. Like the price of eggs these days, the prices on just about everything is up. We can complain, but it does not change the cost. Some increases in sales of goods are becoming necessary as we move forward in 2023.

As the facilities age, there are building and ground needs. The present building was built in the early 1970s and as it ages, the cost of maintenance increases. We presently are waiting on parking lot repairs which was planned a couple months ago, but the rainy weather has hindered this work. We also are working toward the purchase of a storage building in which to store lawn equipment. The Bible Room continues to be a focus of expansion, and presently, we are focusing on building bookshelves for the room.

I have and plan to enjoy visiting among the brethren. I visited with the Missionary Baptist Seminary in Little Rock in January, and plan to be back there later in February. In April, I look forward to visiting with the brethren at Concord Baptist Seminary in Oklahoma, the California State meeting, and the Louisiana Missionary Baptist Seminary in Minden, Louisiana. The meeting of the Baptist Sunday School Committee, a great time of fellowship and sharing, also will come in April. 
The book of Acts provides the most gripping historical account of the explosion and progression of early churches, beginning with a small congregation in Jerusalem. Similar to Jesus' parables of the mustard seed which grows into a large garden tree and leaven which enlarges the dough through continual propagation (Matthew 13:31-33; Luke 13:18-20), God's observable reign through the work of His churches began very small but has been slowly permeating the globe since the first century.

This Spring, students of the Through-the-Bible Series will finish their journey through the book of Acts (Acts 15-28). The historical, biblical account of "Churches Starting New Churches" in Acts compellingly draws students in to observe how God's power worked through His people to bring the peace of His gospel to the world. Luke recorded how the early churches multiplied even as God's enemies heightened their persecution and pressure against Christians.

This study will draw you in and encourage you to participate in God's global purpose of bringing the gospel to the lost, but let me issue a spoiler alert: When you reach the end of the book of Acts, you will not find closure. Why is that? The work of the churches continues.

Not only did Luke leave us without closure regarding the end of Paul's life, but the story is even more open-ended, because the historical account of "Churches Starting New Churches" is still being written. January has been a busy but blessed month at the mission's office. We began the first part of the month by prepping and shipping the yearbooks and church directories. That was another first for me and it was quite the operation. Also, Gena had surgery on her ankle. Her surgery went great, but she is still at home recovering. We appreciate everyone's prayers for the Stewart family and the mission's office over these last few months.

With great joy I report for the month of January 431 professions of faith and 43 baptisms, bringing our totals for the year to 4076 professions of faith, 431 baptisms and 4 churches organized! Praise the Lord!

We also praise God that our Thanksgiving Missions Offering has reached a total of \$300,174.64! We did not know how this would turn out this year but once again, God has provided through the generous giving of His people. We have received offerings from 3 countries, over 20 individuals, and about 260 churches in 25 states. We praise God for this and thank you all for your heart for our associated work and for the missionaries.

Sadly, we have 7 national missionaries who need a new sending church. This decision is no reflection on them personally or the work that they are involved in. They are all sponsored by Landmark MBC in Pine Mountain, GA but because of hardships, they have this need. Please be in prayer about this and contact me if you have questions or interest.

Lastly, the Pre-Association Standing Missionary Committee Meeting will be May 22nd and 23rd, beginning at 1 PM on Monday at Northern Hills Baptist Church, Texarkana, AR. Everyone is welcome and churches recommending missionaries to the 2023 Messenger Body for endorsement, are encouraged to be represented by their pastor, their missionary, or both. Deadline for recommendation forms is April 21st. Please contact our office if you have a new missionary and have questions or need a form. Pray that we have more missionaries this coming year!

God began laying some HUGE things on my heart for the mission, and I realized that we need the help of the Lord to accomplish them. We began the year with a four-part sermon series on the Holy Spirit. I could see him working on the hearts of each one, and it set us up for an amazing Vision Sunday!

Our theme for the year, unveiled during Vision Sunday, is GREATER>! I believe this will be our greatest year yet! We began the year with an end-year reward and mid-year kick-off for JAM. The kids had an awesome time getting to see how many pieces of Ci-Ci's pizza I could eat and then how bad of a bowler I am! I love our kids at church, and we are excited to see them have a GREAT year in JAM in 2023!

I was able to spend the morning of my birthday (turned 46 on Jan. 28) at the Livestock Show supporting Amber and her Nubian goat, "Heavenly Honey". Calvinism: Part 5 Perseverence of the Saints by Datton Herrington

To some Calvinists, Perseverance of the Saints simply teaches eternal security. However, many Calvinists teach something very different. Many teach that Perseverance of the Saints means that once you are saved, you will continue to serve God your whole life. You will not fall away. You will persevere or endure unto the end. And if you do fall away, it is because you were never one of God's elect.

It is important to note that perseverance is not the same as preservation. Perseverance is a human work - preservation (eternal security) is a divine work. The Calvinist's perverted logic teaches that a man can only know that he is one of God's elect if he perseveres in holiness. This belief quickly turns Calvinism to a works-based salvation.

Calvinists rely on their own good deeds for their salvation assurance. In fact, most Calvinists believe that a man who professes to believe on Jesus Christ as his Savior yet does not live a life of holiness and obedience to Christ cannot be one of God's elect. This error goes together with a form of "Lordship Salvation," teaching, "the signature of saving faith is surrender to the lordship of Jesus Christ." Obviously, we should surrender to Christ. We should continue to serve him. But that has nothing to do with our salvation. Once we believe on Christ as our Savior, praise God we're sealed for eternity! That's all we must do to be saved and there's nothing we can do to lose it.

This Calvinistic doctrine is derived from Matthew 24:13, "But he that shall endure unto the end, the same shall be saved." This doctrine can quickly be disproven. Firstly, the context of this passage is talking about fleshly salvation, not spiritual (verse 22). Secondly, salvation is not of works (Eph 2:8-9). So, if salvation can't be obtained by works, it certainly cannot be sustained by works (Rom 11:6). Romans 4:5 states, "But to him that worketh not, but believeth on him that justifieth the ungodly, his faith is counted for righteousness." If someone never does any works for Christ, yet believes on Him, they are saved and they are saved forever.

Perseverance of the Saints exposes Calvinism for what it truly is. Calvinists often give lip service to giving all the glory to God for salvation. But when we examine the doctrine of Perseverance of the Saints, we see that the opposite is true. Calvinism's true colors are revealed to be the same as any other false gospel, a rejection of Jesus' work on the cross for mankind's own works.

It's Time to Get Uncomfortable by Marnie Gregg

In our Christian walk, just as we start to feel comfortable, we are called upon to stretch ourselves. God is not content to leave us as we are. He is constantly drawing us closer to Him through whatever means necessary. It may be through illness, uncertainty, or change.

In my own life, I have been stretched in God's work. Probably the biggest stretch I've made was when we moved to Louisiana. We left family, friends, teammates, classmates, a job I loved, and everything that was comfortable for the sake of doing the work of our Savior. Doing this helped remind me that this uncomfortable feeling is how we, as Christians, should feel ALL of the time on this earth. This world is NOT our home, and we should never truly feel comfortable here.

In 1 Peter 2:11 and Hebrews 11:13, those who serve God in a mighty way are referred to as pilgrims and strangers. Maybe you have felt like a stranger in this world. A stranger is defined as: a newcomer in a place; an outsider; a person who is not a member of a family, group, or community; a person who is not accustomed to something. A stranger feels uncomfortable. Even if you have never moved to a new place, you have probably felt uncomfortable at times. Being uncomfortable and being stretched is different for each of us. For you it may be to:

- serve in a ministry you've never truly enjoyed
- teach a new age group
- forgive those who have hurt you
- worship in a new style
- disciple someone whose lifestyle is foreign to your own
- be alone when you're used to being surrounded by others
- work when you're used to staying home
- support your spouse's ministry even when you do not understand it
- move, even though you want to stay where you are
- stay where you are, even though you want to move
- share the gospel with the friend who may reject it
- share the gospel with a stranger
- speak up when you want to stay quiet
- stay quiet when you want to speak up

When we begin to be uncomfortable, we rely on God even more for our peace and strength. HE ALONE IS OUR TRUE COMFORT. Psalm 18:2 says, "The Lord is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer; my God, my strength, in whom I will trust; my buckler, and the horn of my salvation, and my high tower."

While beginning His own ministry, our Savior did not have a home that made him comfortable. Matthew 8:20 says, "And Jesus saith unto them, the foxes have holes and the birds of the air have nests; but the Son of man hath no where to lay his head." He was not on a mission to feel comfortable in this world, but to be comforted in knowing that He was doing His Father's will.

If our goal is to truly serve Christ, we must get comfortable with being uncomfortable because God is not content to leave us as we are. He wants us to stretch and grow in Him and for Him.
