LMBIS Offering Online Courses Beginning Fall 2023

LMBIS is excited to announce online courses beginning this fall to run concurrently with on-campus classes beginning August 1, 2023. Classes will be taught twice weekly through Zoom by qualified instructors selected by the faculty, trustees, and Calvary Baptist Church.

COURSES FOR THE FALL SEMESTER INCLUDE:

- Homiletics/Lesson Preparation: how to prepare a sermon or lesson along with basic delivery guidance with practical exercises taught by Bro. Jason Hebert, pastor of Acadiana BC of Lafayette, Louisiana.
- Introduction to Missions: teaching the importance of biblical mission work through the Local Church by increasing knowledge and passion for missionaries both local and abroad guided by Bro. Scott Bourland, missionary/pastor of Grace BC of Hope, Indiana.
- The Perfect Tabernacle: understanding the layout, procedures, and representation of the Old Testament Tabernacle and how it points to Christ led by Bro. Keith Rose, pastor of Egypt MBC, Hamburg, Arkansas.
- Christian Doctrine: a basic overview of the beliefs of the Bible covering the ABA Doctrinal Statement instructed by Bro. Bryan Sellers, pastor of Delight MBC of Delight, Arkansas.

- The Book of Revelation: a verse-by-verse study of the book beginning with the church letters and examining the prophetic end times with an emphasis on practical application of both historical and future events instructed by Bro. Allen Blackford, pastor of Hatley MBC of Dover, Arkansas.
- Fundamentals of Music: learning the basics of music theory, reading basic music notations, and simple conducting taught by Bro. Daniel Clark, pastor of El Dorado MBC, El Dorado, Arkansas.

COMING SPRING 2024:

- **Bible Geography:** an overview of the Holy Land surveying points of interest along the path of the Bible giving the student a better geographical understanding of biblical events taught by Bro. Eric Sutton, pastor of New Home MBC of Wetumpka, Alabama.

While beneficial to ministers, these courses are designed for the layperson. They will be taught in a way to benefit all people no matter their level of education or area of service. Classes will be held live in the evenings and available as a recorded version for the student. Besides books and resources, all that is required is an internet device that is capable of video chat.

The Real Thing is Better than a Vision

"After this I looked, and, behold, a door was opened in heaven: and the first voice which I heard was as it were of a trumpet talking with me; which said, Come up hither, and I will shew thee things which must be hereafter" (Revelation 4:1).

John would not quit preaching Jesus. So, he was convicted of such, and sentenced to finish up his life in exile on the isle of Patmos (Rev. 1:9). While there, God gave John one of the greatest honors ever bestowed on a man who was still in his sinful flesh; God pulled back the curtains and gave John glimpses of the eternal realm. God gave John those glimpses, for the most part, so he could write them down and be forever preserved in His Word (Rev. 1:19). But there was some things John experienced that he was not allowed to write down (Rev. 10:4).

While John's experience was amazing, I think everyone would agree that John did not fully experience Heaven due to still being in a mortal body. Once John took his last breath at the time of his death, he entered into the place which God had given him glimpses. John was no longer permissively peeking through the drapes from the outside. He walked right into the very house of God.

We are getting excited about the launching of our online classes. We want to encourage everyone who can to take advantage of this new opportunity to study the Bible. To the person who thinks that the online classes will be just like physically sitting in the classroom at LMBIS, I genuinely feel compelled to warn you. You will just be peeking through the drapes of our seminary.

The full experience of attending classes at Louisiana Missionary Institute and Seminary is difficult to articulate, but I feel compelled to try. Physically sitting next to and learning from men who have much experience on the battlefield for our Lord, is life-changing and more than you can get online. Having your views challenged by another human being who is looking you in the eyes, is life- changing and more than you can get online. The sacrifices you have to make to physically attend seminary are life-changing and more than you can ever get online. The comradery that is found amongst the physical classroom fellowship of preacher brethren is life-changing and more than you can get online. Witnessing the lifechanging clash when a young preacher's character is being sharpened as his iron will meets the iron will of a more experienced preacher whose character is already battle-tested and proven, is life-changing and more than you can ever get online.

Obviously, I am not intending to discourage anyone from taking our online courses. I am, however, intending to encourage to the utmost, everyone who possibly can to attend classes in person if possible. In the world, we are encouraged to find the path of least resistance through life. In this case, however, I want to challenge you to do the harder thing, but for the greater reward. In my 36 years of being associated with LMBIS, I have not ever met anyone who regretted his time at the seminary.

Cohorst Weary in Well-Doing

Most people are results-driven. If an investment is not showing any promise of a return, we pull out and go a different route. If a play does not work, we call a timeout and run a different one. If a method is not working, we come together and come up with a new plan. When the fish are not biting, we move to another hole.

While there is logic behind this mentality, we must be careful when it comes to being results-driven in our walk with the Lord. Of course, we want results, and there is nothing wrong with that. However, if we are not careful, we can lose sight of the main thing.

A results-driven ministry often becomes a ministry of comparison. We begin to compare our results with that of someone else. Sometimes we are blind to the results that are there because we are measuring them compared to someone else's results. If we aren't careful, we can reach a place where we not only want results, but they must be the same as or better results than the next person. We must remember, God blesses in different ways and at different times.

A results-driven ministry disregards Gods timing. We like most things instantly. When results do not come as quickly as we would like, we become discouraged and give up. We expect quick results, and because we do not receive them, we lose hope in God. We want our prayers answered the next day. We want the new program to draw the entire community the next Sunday. A lack of instant results drives some to walking away and giving up.

Paul admonished the churches of Galatia, "And let us not be weary in well doing: for in due season we shall reap, if we faint not" (Galatians 6:9).

Keep doing good. Keep serving. God promises a time of reaping as long as we stay faithful. We do not know the extent of the reaping or the timing of it, but we know in due time, God will send the results. He will send the right kind, the right way, and it will be at the right time. Let Him lead you and trust Him to bless as He sees fit.

It is with thankfulness that I report that 9 out of the 11 missionaries in the Philippines now have new sending churches. Our association is always so quick to fill a need when one arises, and that is a tremendous blessing. I praise the Lord for how He provides through the generous hearts of His people.

Speaking of blessings, for the month of March, the ABA recommended missionaries reported 384 professions of faith, 39 baptisms, and 1 organized church. This brings our totals for the year to 4,901 professions of faith, 497 baptisms, and 5 organized churches. To God be the glory!

I want to remind the churches and their missionaries of four very important events in the near future: (1) The Standing Missionary Committee will meet at Northern Hills BC in Texarkana, AR, May 22-23. The meeting will convene on Monday at 1:00 PM and reconvene on Tuesday morning. Everyone is invited and all recommended missionaries, along with their Sponsoring Church representatives, are encouraged to attend. (2) Missionary Share Time will be on Monday, June 21st from 7:00 to 9:00 PM in the Centennial Ballroom 300BCD at this year's Messenger Meeting. (3) The Missionary Program, presented by the Standing Missionary Committee, will be Wednesday, June 23rd, at 7:00 PM in Exhibit Hall B. (4) The Missionary Breakfast will be on Thursday, June 24th, from 7 PM to 8:30 AM in the Centennial Ballroom 300A. The price for the breakfast is \$30 but all missionaries and their immediate families are invited free of charge.

Baptist Church of Greenwood. Victory is sponsored by Heritage Miss. Baptist Church of Bossier City. Missionary Pastor Mike Russell is working to reach the people of Greenwood and will be announcing plans for organization into a New Testament Church very soon.

Comradery is Part of Seminary by Collin Kelley

When you apply at LMBIS, you are asked the question, "Why do you want to come to seminary?" For me, the answer was to learn about God, first and foremost, but I also wanted to meet like-minded people. People who do what I do: preach the same gospel I preach; pastor churches of like faith; and serve the same God. Seminary gives one more than a degree, books, languages, and knowledge, it gives people.

Seminary is more than a classroom where one sits up straight, does his work, and raises his hand to speak. A seminary is a place where children of God can come and build relationships that will strengthen their walk with the Lord.

Solomon declared, "Iron sharpeneth iron; So a man sharpeneth the countenance of his friend" (Proverbs 27:17). With seminary, one gains this type of relationship. One's walk with the Lord is much easier when he has classmates and instructors who are walking the same walk.

After surrendering to preach at the age of 15 at church camp, I was rarely around anyone who understood what it meant to be a preacher. I felt like Elijah when he said, "I, even I am only left" (1 Kings 19:10). I felt as if there were no one else who could understand what I went through, endured, faced, and saw. Who else surrenders to preach at 15? Who else gives up a scholarship to college to go to seminary? Who else puts away their other passions to go to seminary? When I arrived at the seminary, I felt so small and ashamed because I was surrounded by men who left scholarships, turned down jobs, dropped out of college, left the military, and moved hours away from their homes.

While we may not be serving in the same field, same town, same state, I have classmates who are laboring right beside me. I have men at seminary who are all at different points of their ministry. These are people I can call on at any time for help. I have learned that seminary is not just for a better education, but it is also to build relationships that will last a lifetime.
