

2024 BIBLE CONFERENCE: THE PREACHER AND HIS PREACHING







The faculty of LMBIS is excited to invite the public to the 2024 Bible Conference with the theme of "The Preacher and His Preaching." The dates for this year's conference will be March 11-12 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. in the LMBIS Chapel. A catered lunch will be provided both days and served in the lunchroom of the seminary.

Our guest speakers will be Bro. Jim Crain, former president of LMBIS and current CEO of Bogard Press in Texarkana, Texas; Bro. R.L. Clark, president of Concord Baptist Institute and pastor of Concord Missionary Baptist Church, Norman, Oklahoma; and Bro. Roger Copeland, president of Missionary Baptist Seminary and pastor of Northern Hills Missionary Baptist Church, Texarkana, Arkansas. Each speaker will be preaching an assigned topic once per day.

Through these series of messages, our prayer is that preachers are encouraged and better equipped in their preaching ministry. From the President Thank You. Emphasis Rally. Pray.

Every time I sit before the keyboard to write this article, I am always overwhelmed by the same compulsion. The urge with which I struggle is the persistent impulse to once again say, "Thank You". Extending my thanks for your support of Louisiana Missionary Baptist Institute & Seminary is not a problem for me, but I feel as though it may get old to you, the reader. I wonder if this is the way Paul felt when he wrote, "We give thanks to God always for you all, making mention of you in our prayers" (1 Thessalonians 1:2).

As we enter into the later part of January, we are also nearing our Emphasis Rally for LMBIS. This year's goal will be the same as last year, \$50,000. While our monthly offerings have been tremendous, both the known and the unknown could test our finances.

Of all our known expenses, none hits us harder than insurance for all our buildings. Without our Emphasis Rally offerings, the insurance bill would do great damage to us financially. But because so many of the Lord's churches and people help us reach our goal every year, the school is able to handle this annual expense comfortably.

The unknowns are obviously less predictable, but probable nonetheless. Our buildings are now over 20 years old. Some of the ac units are originals. We are thankful they have lasted as long as they have, but we know that somewhere in the near future, we are going to replace some units. A couple of units in a year's time is a large expense.

Another of the unknowns is the possibility of some new housing facilities. At the time of this writing, we do not have any vacancies in our family units. Thankfully, we currently have just enough, but the trustees are praying about future housing needs for our students.

Things are well at LMBIS. We currently have around 20 in-person students (we have only had one week of classes, and some guys are still undecided about coming). Pray that God will continue to call, and men will answer and prepare themselves for the ministry. The inaugural semester of our online classes was a success. The enrollment was good, and the feedback was excellent. Continue to pray for our online program.

Please continue to pray. We are regularly receiving calls from churches looking for a pastor. The calls are coming from across the country. From California to Florida, from Montana to Louisiana. All across our country, the Lord has churches who are looking for God's man to lead them. We are seeing an unbelievable shortage of preachers. Sadly, we usually have few, if any names of potential pastors to offer. This is troubling for both us and the church needing a pastor.

Please continue to pray for us as we endeavor to help God's men help God's churches. Thanks again for all you have done in the past, what you are doing right now, and will do in the future. You are always welcome to stop by, sit in, and enjoy a cup of coffee.

"And the time that he reigned over Israel was forty years; seven years reigned he in Hebron, and thirty and three years reigned he in Jerusalem. And he died in a good old age, full of days, riches, and honour: and Solomon his son reigned in his stead," 1 Chronicles 29:27, 28.

This winter quarter, we eagerly anticipate our journey through the Bible texts of 2 Samuel 5–24, 1 Kings 1; 2 and 1 Chronicles 11–29 in the Bogard Press Adult Sunday School curriculum. The title of this quarterly study is "The Reign of David–Sweet Psalmist of Israel," and the aim of the quarter is for the student to learn the character traits that contributed to David's reputation as a man after God's own heart.

When God determined to remove Saul from his position as King of Israel, the prophet Samuel informed him that God had instead sought for Himself a man after His own heart (1 Samuel 13:14), which David ultimately satisfied. This quarter, we will observe the leadership of King David, and the curious Bible student may have trouble understanding how David could be characterized as pursuing God's heart considering the many blunders and sins he committed.

The apostle Paul had no trouble acknowledging this quality about David when he preached to the Jews in Antioch, coming to the same

conclusion about David's devotion to God (Acts 13:22). What is it about David that made him a man after God's heart? How might God's people be described in the same manner?

David trusted God completely. He exhibited faith that led him to find his ultimate satisfaction in God's presence and provision. His faith in God led him to become a man of love, forgiveness, humility and integrity. David's faith compelled him to worship God alone with all his being, and his example led others to do the same. His faith in God made him a man after God's heart, and it is our faith that will inspire us to the same degree of devotion. Of all the things we may pursue, let it be the presence of God we desire most.

Bro. Brandon Jones (ABATech):

Thank you to Bro. Tim Lem of Eastfield Baptist Church in Mesquite, Texas, for donating 5,000 feet of Ethernet cable to the ABATech ministry! This will be a blessing to the churches!

Speaking of cables - many churches have TVs or projectors in the sanctuary, and many more are interested in adding them. One limitation in the past has been that HDMI cables (from the computer to the projector or TV) can't be longer than 50'. To resolve that issue, we've used boxes that convert HDMI to Ethernet and back to HDMI on the other end, allowing you to run the long distance over ethernet cable. This worked but had a few caveats. 1.) Cost - the converter boxes are expensive. 2.) Clutter - Most church sound booths don't have room for ANOTHER device on the table. 3.) Another point of failure - I know of a church in Arkansas that has had to replace these boxes twice due to loss from power surges in the building. Well, there's great news! There is a new cable on the market that has HDMI connectors on each end, but is fiber in between. This cable will allow for a direct run from the computer to the projector/ TVs even over long distances.

REMEMBERING BRO. CARTER

On December 14, 2023, Dr. Jerry Carter left this earthly world and entered the presence of His Lord in Heaven. Bro. Carter was born March 1, 1936, to his parents Authur and Allie Carter of Hamburg, Arkansas. He was saved in a revival meeting at Calvary MBC in Hamburg in 1950. Bro. Fred Vining was the pastor at that time, and the revival speaker was Bro. A. T. Powers. In April 1958, Bro. Carter was

ordained as a deacon in Calvary church, and later that year, he surrendered to the Lord's call to preach the gospel message. Through the years of his ministry, 1958 – 2023, Bro. Carter pastored Egypt MBC, Hamburg, Arkansas; Meadow Grove MBC, Tallulah, Louisiana (as local missionary); Central MBC, Warren, Arkansas; Springhill MBC, Springhill, Louisiana; Gethsemane MBC, El Dorado, Arkansas; and Mapelvale MBC, Hamburg, Arkansas. He also served on the Standing Missionary Committee of the American Baptist Association from 1997 to 2004. He also served in other associational positions, always helping the Lord's work wherever he could.

In June of 1956, Bro. Carter married Clara Jeffers of the Hamburg, Arkansas area. Mrs. Carter remained a faithful wife, mother, and helpmeet to Bro. Carter until his death. In all his appointed places to serve the Lord, Mrs. Carter faithfully helped and served the Lord alongside of him. The Carters had three children, Debbie (wife of music minister Lewis Hinkel), Pastor Barry Carter, and Karen. All three of these children have been faithfully involved in church work through their lives. Among several grandchildren is Pastor Micah Carter of Magnolia, Arkansas.

As preachers often find a hobby to help them in their lives, Bro. Carter loved breeding, raising, and showing chickens. He was good at it. He knew all the breeds and varieties and could discuss the details with the best. He served and helped poultry clubs and was much appreciated in the show chicken community.

Bro. Carter attended Louisiana Missionary Baptist Institute and Seminary in Minden, Louisiana, during the 1970s, where he received his Bachelor and Master of Theology degrees. He taught classes at LMBIS at different times over the years, served on the Alumni Committee, and served as Dean from June 1997 – 2005. Following his departure, LMBIS awarded him the Doctor of Divinity degree for his many years of faithful involvement and support of the seminary, as well as his years of helping ministers and churches.

Many younger preachers were helped by his gentle and kind way. Often preachers would go to him seeking advice and encouragement, and he was faithful to help them with a special grace. He was a faithful steward, and his departing leaves an emptiness that challenges the brethren to fill. We give God thanks and praise for allowing us to experience this man, Bro. Jerry Carter.

PRAY FOR ME


Brethren, I need your prayers as I begin what will be a new ministry for me. My 39 years in the ministry has been either pastoring one of the Lord's churches or doing mission work.
