

From the President Help Us Reach Our Goal of \$50,000

I began my first year of seminary training at LMBIS in 1986. I vividly remember my multi-faceted ignorance. Understandably, I knew little about the school, her purpose, her faculty, her staff, her students, her organizational structure, and her finances. I also remember my ignorant surprise at the amount of the emphasis rally goal.

I could not help but wonder why the school needed an offering of tens of thousands of dollars. To an 18-year-old in 1986, \$20 was a lot of money, \$100 was more than a paycheck, and \$1,000 was more than I paid for my first 4 vehicles. To me, the amount the school was trying to raise was an unimaginable amount of money.

Moving ahead 39 years, here we are today. Now I sit behind the president's desk of LMBIS. Now I am the one setting the amount of the emphasis rally goal. Now I am the one asking others to help us raise what is still a large amount of money. The huge differences are these: (1) Now I know why these funds are necessary, and (2) I have seen the Lord's people meet the need time, and time again.

The Emphasis Rally Goal for 2025 is once again set at \$50,000. These funds are essential to the continuation of the ministry of the school. These funds take care of three primary needs of the school:

Our annual insurance premium. Last year our premium was over \$17,000. As of this writing, we haven't yet received our annual bill, but we have no reason to expect a decrease. On the contrary, we are expecting an increase. Over one-third of the emphasis rally offering is immediately used to pay for insurance.

Any monthly shortfall we might have in monthly support. While our monthly support is wonderful, and adequate to meet our normal operating expenses, it is not sufficient to cover the replacement costs of air conditioning units, appliances, etc. While these are not normal monthly expenses, they are somewhat predictable expenses.

Improvements. Stagnancy is not an option. We must always be looking at ways to improve our school. Sometimes these are building projects and remodeling. We always try to take a portion of the emphasis rally goal and set aside for the larger improvements for our school.

Rest assured; the offerings you send to LMBIS are appreciated for what they are. They are the hard-earned money of the Lord's people who then graciously give to the school either through their church or individually. Every major expense of this school is vetted as necessary by leaving my desk, being approved by the trustees, and then approved by Calvary MBC, the sponsoring church. This process ensures that much deliberation is given so that wisdom is the filter through which these funds flow.

Thank you for your prayers. Thank you for your continued support. Thank you in advance for helping us reach our goal of \$50,000. "All glory and praise to the Lamb that was slain. Who has borne all our sins and has cleansed every stain."

Missions is Our Middle Name

Several years ago, a church was gathered in a regular business meeting and the church's finances was the topic of discussion. The offerings had been running short of the necessary income to cover the monthly expenses for several months, and the situation was becoming dire. After examining the financial report, a sense of gloom hung in the air.

Members began discussing different ways to reduce expenses and even a few began exploring ways to raise extra funds. One person mentioned reducing the amount of mission giving and it was as if the air was sucked out of the room. As the thought hung in the air, one man exclaimed, "But missionary is our middle name!" The statement jolted the members back from the dreaded thought of reducing their support of missions. They moved on to other business without another mention of reducing mission support and, after committing the situation to prayer, God provided their needs.

That statement is so true today. For churches who identify as Missionary Baptist, they have chosen to identify themselves as being strong supporters of missions. It has been often said that mission work is the "lifeblood" of a church. The need for association among the Lord's churches is grounded in the need to support mission work. Churches assisting churches to send out missionaries and establish new churches is the primary reason for the existence of associations.

Being the bedrock of church work, mission work must be a priority of the Lord's churches. This includes churches sending missionaries to the fields of labor. Just as the church at Antioch was obedient to the Holy Spirit in Acts Chapter 13 by sending out Paul and Barnabas, churches must obey the Spirit in sending men to the mission field.

Once missionaries are sent, churches must support these men. Prayer by members of churches is a lifeline for missionaries serving in often difficult fields. Financial support is necessary to fund the needs of the missionary and his family. Continual communication is important for the overall wellbeing of the missionary as well as the church's ability to understand his needs. Sending the pastor and church members to the field to assist the missionary is vital. Sending a missionary is a great responsibility for a church, but it carries with it great rewards.

God never intended churches to support missions alone. He desires churches to work together in supporting missionaries. While some may not directly send, every church has a responsibility to support. This pattern of support is set in the Bible. Churches supported men as they served in other fields of labor. Supporting missions increases the gospel witness of the local church but also enhances the bonds of the associated work.

Every church must always remember– "Missionary is our middle name." The church is the vehicle that carries the Gospel to the world and mission work is the means by which it is done.



Merry Christmas and Happy New Year! This is a time where we reflect on the goodness of God and anticipate new opportunities to serve Him. May we always remember to serve God faithfully where we are and He will place us where He wants us tomorrow.

During our Louisiana State Association meeting in November many good things transpired. I would like to highlight two that affected our missions program. First, the messengers established a loan program available to the churches and missions in Louisiana. The funds to establish this program were from the generous gift of Calvary MBC in Minden in 2023. A church or mission can request a loan at zero interest no later than 60 days prior to the state association meeting. The standing Missionary Committee will evaluate the request and make a recommendation to the messengers for a vote. Second, at the end of each month any balance greater than \$1,000.00 in the Missions General Operating Fund will be transferred to the Emergency Fund. This will allow the Emergency Fund to grow to meet the needs of our churches in time of emergency while keeping an adequate balance in the General Operating Fund. I thank the messengers for these two actions and I believe they will have a beneficial impact for years to come.

Our missionaries continue to do a great job preaching and spreading the Gospel. Please continue to keep them in your prayers.

Are you a missionary? Perhaps you answer this question based upon whether or not God has called you into the ministry. Many would say they are not a missionary because they aren't called to a certain field to start a church. However, a missionary is simply one who has a mission to carry out. If you have been saved by the blood of Jesus, followed Him in scriptural baptism and joined a true New Testament church, then you absolutely have a mission to carry out. Our mission is to share the gospel message of Jesus Christ. I want to share with you some Characteristics of a Missionary from Romans 15:18-21. Are these things evident in your life?

First, A Missionary is Fruitful according to verses 18-19a. Paul says his purpose in preaching to the Gentiles is to make them obedient by word and deed. "Obedience to the faith" seems to be a reoccurring theme which Paul refers to throughout the letter to the Romans. This is a term he uses to refer to the evidence of changed lives in those who believed his message. In other words, when Paul left a place after preaching the gospel, he left behind evidence that he had been there. That evidence was saved people, new converts with changed lives in word and deed. Are we leaving behind this kind of evidence in our lives or are we leaving a mess behind? In verse 19 Paul credits success to the Spirit of God. A real missionary doesn't care about taking the credit, rather he wants God to receive the glory for the fruit produced.

Next, A Missionary is Faithful according to verse 19b. According to 2 Corinthians 5:20 we are to be ambassadors of Christ. That means that we are to represent the heavenly country in this foreign land called earth. We are to herald a message from our home land of heaven. We have all the authority of God behind our message. How faithful are we as ambassadors? Paul took this responsibility seriously. Have we been so faithful in mission work that we could echo the words of Paul when he said, "I have fully preached the gospel?"

Last, A Missionary is Focused according to verses 20-21. Paul was focused on the fact that there were people who had never heard the gospel of Jesus Christ. He was determined to take the Word where the Word had never been taken! Are we? Paul didn't go around recruiting saved people! Paul was focused on the lost people who needed Jesus!

I pray to God that we would allow Paul's burden to be our burden and allow his pattern to challenge us in our daily mission endeavors. Let us live our life focused on what matters most. Focus our eyes on Jesus and those around us who need to hear about His saving grace.

January finds us beginning the mailing of literature for the Spring quarter, so it is a busy month for the shipping department. The Press Room is cranking up their printing of future materials. As we end the former year, our Perfect Binder machine has failed us. This is the machine that puts the square spine binding on the Sunday School Commentary. We are in the process of fixing it, but at the time of this writing, it is worrisome. The

Perfect Binder is getting old and may have to be replaced soon at an estimated cost of \$250,000.00. Sending the materials out for binding also is cost prohibitive and only is an option if we have no other choice. So hopefully, we can get it fixed and keep using it until it can't be fixed.

Paper prices on our most used paper will receive

an 8% increase in cost after January 1, 2025. This increase was expected as mentioned in an earlier report. We have purchased all we can store at the lower price. There is hope that by the end of 2025, the price will reduce somewhat.

The employees continue to do a great job week after week. At present, we have a full workforce. One young part-time lady will be leaving us soon to return to college, and another will be taking maternity leave. These ongoing changes are normal as God always supplies our needs with great folks. We have worked to lift the wages here to be more competitive in the community. Afterall, we have very deserving employees. I am glad to see a new level of pay being reached that is indeed much more competitive for our area. Thank the Lord.

Our finances are good, and our work atmosphere is great. If you are in Texarkana, come visit. If I can be of any service to you, please ask. Thank you for the opportunity to serve.

"Seven years old was Jehoash when he began to reign. And Jehoash did that which was right in the sight of the LORD all his days wherein Jehoiada the priest instructed him" (2 Kings 11:21; 12:2).

"Now after the death of Jehoiada came the princes of Judah, and made obeisance to the king. Then the king hearkened unto them" (2 Chronicles 24:17).

This year's Vacation Bible School-Timeless-will teach students lessons from a few lesser-known people in the Bible, among whom is Joash. The aim of our lesson on Joash, the upright king, will be to inspire students to do the right thing, no matter how young or old they are. Our prayer is that students will personally adopt the lesson's application: "I can set the right example."

> King Joash was only seven years old when he took the throne, yet with God's help and the wise guidance of Jehoida, he was able to lead great reforms among God's people. He obeyed God, instructed, trained and influenced by Jehoida, bringing revival and repairing the Temple.

Yet, the history of Joash took a cautionary turn when Jehoida died. The caveat for Joash's God-pleasing leadership was that he did what was right as long as Jehoida was alive. Once Jehoida passed, Joash began listening to the wrong influences, even when God sent prophets to warn him (2 Chronicles 24:19). Joash permitted God's people to leave the house of the Lord and serve idols, hastening God's judgment upon them.

When it comes to Christian education, the historical account of Joash provides us with an obvious but often neglected lesson: children require older saints to lovingly guide them with the wisdom of God's Word. Too often these days, young people are rarely in the presence of wise, godly adults. May we take the lesson of Joash to heart and create spaces in our churches for godly wisdom to be passed down from one generation to the next.
