From the President Peace? Peace? Where Are You?

I was recently talking to some members of a family which is sadly too familiar with tragedies and bad news. One of the repeated comments from the family was the consistent struggle to find the peace that Jesus promised. When one reads the promises of Jesus, it seems as though peace is just a prayer away. Just ask for it, and you get it. But the reality is that peace often proves itself to be quite elusive.

Usually, the word peace is used in the Bible to describe the absence of conflict between men, or the absence of conflict between man and God. Even one of the most touted verses, Colossians 3:15, is in the context of getting along with one another in love. The word peace is also often used to describe being silent or holding your peace.

However, there are times when the word peace is obviously used to describe a condition of emotional tranquility. Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give unto you: not as the world giveth, give I unto you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27).

When the worst news has found you, hiding is futile. You get swept away by an emotional tsunami, and a quick recovery is impossible. Wave, after wave, after wave, bash the emotions and toss a person around like a tissue in a hurricane. Finding footing seems impossible. The cries for help and peace are regular, but the storm rages without regard. You beg God for peace, but peace seems to have hidden herself. She is now only a memory that once accompanied your former life.

Did not Jesus promise peace? This dilemma plagues the heart of the broken. The broken saved person starts to wonder. "Why is God doing this to me?" "Am I really saved?" "What is God trying to tell me?" "Why is God angry with me?" "Where is the peace that Jesus promised?" are just a few of the myriads of questions and doubts that regularly haunt the thoughts of the broken. The broken is begging God for a supernatural peace that makes everything ok, but is this really what Jesus promised?

Jesus promised His apostles a peace that was not of this world, but He never promised that everything in their life would be ok. As a matter of fact, their lives were not ok. Every one of those men died as martyrs. They were hunted, humiliated, tortured, and killed. The condition of these men's lives does not sound like peace.

The broken must understand that Jesus promised a peace that isn't of this world. The only way man understands peace is as the absence of conflict or chaos. Logically, the only way a person can have peace is for their storm to end, and their life be restored to a pre-storm condition. Anything other than this is troubling. Peace as man understands it is no longer an option for the broken. But Jesus offers an undefinable peace.

Because His peace is undefinable, it is often difficult to recognize. Peace from Jesus doesn't dry all tears. Peace from Jesus doesn't miraculously eliminate grief. His peace, however, has a remarkable way of patching until the full repair is made.

Ministry Transitions

I reached a milestone in my ministry a few years ago. It was sudden, and, though I knew it would come one day, it still caught me off guard. This milestone was not a single event on a particular day, but a gradual transition dictated by separate events.

The first notion of a change came in the fall of 2016. I had recently moved to Bossier City to pastor and decided to take a couple of seminary classes that was not offered when I was a student. I sat beside a twenty-twoyear-old and realized guickly that my nearly forty-year-old mind was not as sharp. Furthermore, I was viewed by the students as an "older preacher" and addressed as "sir" by nearly all of them. I felt so disconnected from a generation of which I still considered to belong.

The next thing I noticed was the lack of "older preachers" everywhere I went. Every association meeting was attended by a growing number of preachers younger than me. Only a few preachers older than me seemed to attend, but they seemed closer to my age than ever before. I also found myself gravitating toward these older gentlemen, seeking fellowship and finding more in common with them than ever before.

The most notable transition was in my pastorate. No longer was I the young, naive pastor the same age as most member's grandchildren. I had become someone taken more seriously and looked to for spiritual guidance by the membership. My words and actions seem to carry more weight. Mistakes and silliness became less tolerated. People seemed to respect me beyond the office I held as their pastor and had greater trust in my counsel.

A final event pushed me further down the path of ministry. The Lord called my father home to heaven in 2021, and the weight of life hung heavy on my shoulders. While I have always been independent, my dad would no longer serve as a potential safety net in case I made a mistake. I had to learn to trust solely on my Father in heaven in ways that I never had before. The Lord grew me and my faith in ways that causes me to praise Him despite my grief.

As I consider my situation right now, if the Lord delays His coming for me and doesn't call me home, I'm at the halfway point. I have been in the ministry for twenty-seven years, and I will have pastored for twenty-five this year. I remind myself more often that it is by His grace I have made it this far and that by His grace that I will continue. He has taught me that the greatest requirement for me is my faithfulness to Him. Above all else, I have learned that the Lord is good.

"Moreover it is required in stewards, that a man be found faithful." (1 Corinthians 4:2)



HYDE PARK ANNOUNCES NEW MBSF DIRECTOR



My name is Trey Campbell, and I am the new MBSF Director for Louisiana Tech University in Ruston, Louisiana. My wife, Hagan, and I moved to Ruston at the very end of 2024, unsure of what the future held; for the last three- and one-half years I've been serving as youth pastor at a church in Oak Grove.

Through faith and prayer, God allowed us to cross paths with Bro. Trey Emory of Hyde Park Baptist Church out of West Monroe. Hyde Park had been praying for God to send them a director for this work that they felt Him moving them to begin, even though they themselves aren't located in Ruston. I began to feel God's conviction and call to this ministry. Though I have been in youth ministry for over 10 years, I have developed a passion for apologetics, connecting with people from all walks of life, and specifically those of the upcoming generation.

Louisiana Tech is growing rapidly, with over 11,000 students currently enrolled with 2,000 of those being freshman. The campus has students from forty-four states and more than sixty foreign countries. They have over twenty religious/spiritual organizations. It is a massive mission field.

While Tech has several wonderful Baptist Churches in the area, Ruston currently does not have any institutions from our work. Hagan and I are both excited and anxious to begin this work. The church has been a wonderful sending church, supporting us in ways we didn't even realize we needed.

We need more support from churches like yours. To say this ministry is in its infancy is an understatement; we currently have no building or framework from which to launch. We need help financially, but we also need help making connections. I am spending this summer on deputation, trying to raise support and meeting students who are either already enrolled or coming to Tech in the Fall. Our plan is to start with a group of students coming from churches within our work, training them up in scripture and apologetics-focused evangelism, and reaching the rest of the campus.

Classes for the Fall Quarter begin in September, and we aim to have our first service on September 9, 2025. If you would like to hear more about this ministry, please reach out. I would love to come and present this work to your church. We want as many churches as possible within our association to be involved.

We also need your prayers for myself, entering this new field of ministry, for my wife, and for Bro. Trey and our sponsoring church. Most importantly, please pray for the students.

BUSINESS MANAGER REPORT

The Sunday School Committee met in Texarkana at the end of April. They accepted my recommendation to allocate \$30,000.00 from our Building Fund for an enclosure for our Print-on-Demand presses. This is to stop a problem we have been having in that area. They also allocated \$40,000 from the Building Fund for a new air conditioner unit for the bookstore. The present one is much beyond its lifespan. Also, \$105,000 was allocated from the Equipment Fund for I.T. upgrades. In addition to these expenditures, we recently paid off a \$27,000 loan. Having the money to pay for these things is a blessing from God.

Although we have always sought ways to advertise and promote our products, we are presently looking into new marketing strategies. We have recently set a time for a marketing specialist to meet with us and discuss new ideas. This service will be a no-cost-to-us service for which

I thank the Lord. Looking forward, some of the ideas for marketing will cost and some are very expensive. It is sort of like one said, "it's the cost of doing business." I'm sure glad God is helping us.

The Heidelberg Press and the Print-on-demand presses are keeping busy printing. All our printing processes are on schedule or ahead of schedule.

Our finances are good and steady, even with our recent decisions to spend some extra on needs. All is well in Texarkana.

I am looking forward to attending the meeting of the messengers of the churches of the American Baptist Association in Springfield, Missouri in June. The Baptist Sunday School Committee is scheduled to have a meeting on Tuesday morning at 10:00 am. Brother Clements and I will have an opportunity to report on the ministry to the committee members and to any visitors at the meeting. The main messenger meeting will begin on Tuesday afternoon and continue in the Tuesday evening session. It is my understanding that an opportunity will be given in the Tuesday evening session for nominations to be given for the position of Editor-in-Chief.
